SERMON NOTES Read | Samuel 22

Talk about it...

What is your biggest takeaway from 1 Samuel 22?

To what new depths of depravity does Saul descend in 1 Samuel 22:6-19? In what way does this further our understanding of the evil of his heart and his sin against God and his people? What does David do, in contrast to Saul (22:20-23)?

Not many people would see themselves in Saul the way that he's described in this chapter. And yet, we see the inevitable downward spiral of a heart gripped by sin. What warnings and lessons can we take from Saul's trajectory?

Saul's jealousy and ego move from selfishness to overt sacrilege. Is there a way that our selfishness can cause us to drift toward profaning worship or casting it off altogether? Explain. How can a life turned more in on itself become less concerned with the things of God? What are some ways in our own culture and context this can happen? How can we prevent this drift?

In his great hymn "A Mighty Fortress," Martin Luther writes this about Satan: "Still our ancient foe doth seek to work us woe. His craft and pow'r are great; and, armed with cruel hate, on earth is not his equal." In what way does Saul prove to be similar to this description of Satan as he pursues God's anointed one in the passage we are studying?

Psalm 52 is thought to have been written while David was on the run in 1 Samuel 22. Read that psalm and share what sticks out to you.

What comfort does it give you?

What stark contrast does 1 Samuel 22 paint between the character of David and the character of Saul? What do outlaws and broken people find in the presence of David? What do religious leaders find in the presence of Saul?

What do we continue to learn throughout this passage about the sin, the obsession, and the anger that characterize Saul? What do we learn about the character and faithfulness of God—as well as about the care he shows to David and the plan he has for him?

David takes blame for what happened at Nob even though Saul is the true guilty party. Yet in Saul, we never see any hint of contrition or repentance. What does this teach us about the difference between pride and humility when it comes to sin? What would prevent us from taking blame when we aren't the ones truly at fault? How does this action by David point us to the gospel?

Abiathar is promised safety if he clings to David. Does Jesus promise something similar to those who would cling to Him? Explain. How does this free us to risk and obey? How does it free us to be selfless and quick to repent? How does it comfort us?
